One would be "Felipe," an old but ageless gardener who has been long years with HCJB. In fact, his boy "Nicolas" was born on the very day that HCJB first broadcast the Gospel. That was December 25, 1931.

Now that Nicolas has grown up a bit, he and Father are partners in ploughing and planting for HCJB.

ONE OF THE FEW PEOPLE in Quito who had a radio receiver and could listen to the first programs of HCJB was Señora Carmela Ochoa. God very graciously spoke to her heart through the gospel messages over the air and she became the "firstfruits" of missionary broadcasting.

Ever since she has been busy for her Master, broadcasting regularly for Indian listeners in Quechua, the language which she learned as a child from the servants in her home, and for her own people in Spanish.

Somehow, together Nicolas and Sra. Ochoa seem to symbolize that great group of prayer warriors and Christian stewards to whom all the staff of HCJB send warmest holiday greetings, and to whom we feel so grateful as our "partners in ploughing and planting" the Word of God by radio into Latin America and all the world.

It is our earnest desire, on this sixteenth anniversary, that you may be as aware of the reality of this partnership as we are here on the field.

# CHRISTMAS BROADCASTING

Hark! the herald angels sing

"Behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people" (Luke 2:10).

## On the Field Now

At the beginning of the summer there came to us, as appreciated members of the staff in Quito, Mr. and Mrs. George Poole, Jr., and their two children. They were to help fill the demands of an expanding program schedule. In addition Mr. Poole, an experienced and capable pilot, was to give attention to the problems and possibilities of missionary aviation in Ecuador.

There was one mission plane on the field, "El Evangelista" (the Evangelist), owned by the Gospel Missionary Union and operated by their missionary-pilot, Bob Hart.

Late in August Mr. Hart had undertaken to fly in food and supplies for missionaries working among the Jivaro Indians in the jungles that lie to the east of the Andes—a long, exhausting trip on the trail, a brief flight by plane. George Poole had gone along to gain an understanding of the problems involved in jungle flying.

The morning of August 29 they took off from a field carved out of the jungle, gained an altitude of 5,400 feet, then suddenly heard the engine slacken its pace. Despite all efforts they were losing altitude rapidly and both saw that a crash landing in the tangled jungle was inevitable. Prayerfully they recognized what this would probably mean.

Bob Hart, at the controls, "pancaked" the plane into the trees. God, who notes the sparrow's fall, brought

the battered fuselage with its precious cargo to the ground—and the missionaries climbed out. Mr. Hart's leg injury made it impossible for him to walk. Mr. Poole, though bruised and battered, was able to start off in what he believed to be the direction to the Shell Oil Company's jungle station, Shell Mera. It was nine days later—nine days of urging a sore, fatigued, un nourished body through the tangled network of tropical jungle—that George Poole reached Shell Mera, guided by friendly Indians he had found.

The next morning a search party of missionaries, guided by the same Indians, found Mr. Hart alive and without further injury.

Not every staff member of The Voice of the Andes has this sort of an introduction to Ecuador! All of us join in gratitude to the God of all grace for sparing Mr. Hart to the Gospel Missionary Union and Mr. Poole to his lovely family and the work of HCJB. We present the Pooles for your remembrance in prayer and bring you this word of testimony from them, written from the field after the jungle experience was over. They write:

*"We feel that we have one of the greatest privileges that could ever come to human beings, and that is to be able to serve the Living God in the place where*

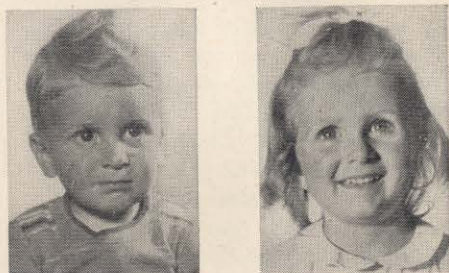

VITAL LINK in the constant flow of equipment, support, mail, transcriptions, and personnel between the grounds of HCJB in Ecuador and the United States is the New York office. It is one of the less publicized but more essential aspects of the work of the pioneer missionary broadcaster, The Voice of the Andes. For our interested friends, here is a close-up of that vital link and its functions.

## NEW YORK OFFICE

If you could step into our transmitter and studio buildings in Quito, and then could see behind the instrument boards, you would see the tremendous amount of radio equipment necessary to the functioning of HCJB. You see, we are really **seven** stations operating under the one public designation of "HCJB." Nearly all of the equipment necessary to maintain these transmitters must be purchased in the States. The buying, packing, and shipping is one of the New York office's chief functions.

The directors of The Voice of the Andes take turns in administering the work on the field and at home. This office provides, in the second place, a "base of operations" for the one at home.

Your **Radio Missionary Log**, and other English literature essential to this ministry are sent to you quickly and efficiently from this location.

Finally, your gifts sent in to make HCJB possible are promptly receipted and recorded, and are channeled into Ecuador with the greatest efficiency in getting a good rate of exchange so that every penny of your gift will secure its highest value.

In the heart of New York City a small office is maintained, but the bulk of the work is carried on in Vozandes Residence located in the suburbs at Flushing, Long Island. Here much more space at much greater economy is provided for office operations and for the storage and shipment of supplies for Quito. At the moment, for instance, the basement is loaded with transmitter tubes which our business manager secured from a war assets dealer at one-tenth of the usual cost!

Here there is also provided at least cost a home for director and staff members resident in the New York area, and for members passing through on their way to and from the field.

So, from the tube-laden basement, through the offices of the first floor, the living quarters housing at present three staff families, to the little office on the third floor where the materials for HCJB's projected Institute of the Air are being turned out, the New York office and residence work for our Saviour and for you, His Church, whom we represent in maintaining a witness to His saving grace around the world by radio.

# Youth! ON THE AIR IN SPANISH

CHRISTIANITY IS a singing faith, and its song is voiced most jubilantly by children and young people who have been redeemed by the precious blood of Christ. Two weekly youth broadcasts emanating from The Voice of the Andes and directed to the Spanish-speaking world aim to emphasize this glorious truth.

Children in all lands are attractive just because they are children, but we feel that the little Ecuadoreans who participate in the program, "La Escuela Dominical

del Aire" (The Sunday School of the Air), take the prize! Every Sunday a group of twenty or more are before the microphones in the half hour period between 6:30 and 7:00 P.M. dedicated to Spanish-speaking children the world around. Ably helped by Auntie Marian Clark and by Uncles Bob Clark and Marco Paredes they sing and tell about the Saviour who has come to dwell in their hearts. The mite-sized soloists approach the microphones like the radio veterans they are and sing in lusty tones all out of proportion to their stature. Letters expressing appreciation for their testimony come from

all areas of South and Central America and even from weary, wounded Spain. We remember the words of our Lord, "Suffer the little children . . . for of such is the kingdom of heaven."

The second youth program is truly what the Spanish announcer always calls it, "the program of joy and inspiration." "Adelante Juventud" begins at 8:00 P.M. on Friday as a chorus of young men sing the Spanish version of the well known song, "V Is For Victory." The piano, electric organ, and trombone join with the men in praising God for giving victory over sin and Satan. Solos, trios, and instrumental selections occupy the first twenty minutes of this happy half hour. Then follows the gospel message generally presented by D. S. Clark, who loves young and old alike with a love that is of God. By the letters received from our many listeners below the Rio Grande we know that our Lord has chosen to use this program for the spread of the Gospel and the salvation of souls.

Immediately after each Friday's program a number of us gather together for prayer, looking to God for a mighty movement of His Spirit among the youth of Latin America. Well documented statistics show that South America is the fastest growing population area in the world. That means millions of children and young people. "La Escuela Dominical del Aire" and "Adelante Juventud" are programs designed to reach them. Esteemed reader, join with us in prayer for these programs and all other means of reaching Spanish-speaking youth with the Gospel. God will hear and answer!

### ★ Grand Piano

Music is all important in missionary broadcasting because Gospel hymns and songs are the major attraction for many listeners. By the gift of this new grand piano to HCJB (the first the station has ever owned) discerning friends will make possible better musical presentations over the Pioneer Missionary Broadcaster.

### ★ Magnetic Recorder

An evangelist tried during the war years to purchase adequate wire or tape recording equipment to give to HCJB. Because all such material was given over to the government, only recently was our friend able to secure a fine new tape recorder for use at The Voice of the Andes. By permitting rebroadcasts of certain programs at later hours, this machine presents the possibility of doubling the efficiency of our missionary broadcasting staff.

### "Use these diamonds for HCJB!"

At the conclusion of a missionary service where the claims of Christ upon all that we possess had been emphasized, a lady came forward and rather hesitatingly questioned the HCJB worker, "Can you change jewelry into money for missionary broadcasting?" Station HCJB now operates six transmitters in Quito with a retransmission station in Guayaquil. From three workers in 1931, the staff has grown to forty-two workers in 1947. Thousands of Gospel programs have been broadcast down through the sixteen years past. At present sixteen languages are being used and two more are being arranged for. Thousands of listeners' letters testify to God's blessing in salvation of souls and inspiration to Christians in Ecuador and around the world. God's stewards have

been gracious in responding to the increasing needs for such a growing organization, and hundreds of prayer warriors faithfully uphold the work of missionary broadcasting at the throne of grace.

Home Advisory Councils for HCJB now function in the United States, Canada, England, and Scotland. More and more missionary societies and other groups are taking up the vision of using radio broadcasting to spread the Gospel to the ends of the earth. For these and all other blessings from the Master we are deeply grateful as co-laborers together with the Lord in the W.R.M.F.

### STAFF MEMBER OF HCJB VISITS SOUTHERN REPUBLICS

Dr. Manuel Garrido Aldama has been visiting countries to the south of Ecuador where HCJB has had many radio listeners during the past years. He would have us. He has provided our needs in a marvelous way, and we know that we can trust Him for all things.

"For a time it looked as though He had chosen to end our ministry after we had been here only two months, but God gloriously provided deliverance from certain death to again serve Him in this place. The opportunities provided here to reach the lost are almost unlimited, and it is our prayer that we may be faithful in doing everything that we possibly can to present Christ to a lost and dying world.

"We have seen at first hand now the tremendous need of missionary aviation here in Ecuador, and there lies upon our hearts a heavy burden of prayer that the Lord will somehow, some way, supply the plane for that much needed work. Will you join in prayer along that line? Also pray with us that as the good news of the Gospel goes out from HCJB it may reach those—wherever they may be—who need Christ more than anything else in the world."

10:30 PM to 12:30 AM — "Late Nite Broadcasts"

QUITO TIME is the equivalent of EASTERN STANDARD TIME and is five hours slower than Greenwich mean time.

## ✓ **HERE ARE THE LOCATIONS**

Four **shortwave** stations are operated simultaneously for your listening convenience. Tune to that station which gives the best reception at your listening point. If reception conditions change during a program, switch to another wavelength of HCJB.

1. 24 Meters, equal to 12.5 megacycles (locate on your dial between 12 and 13).
2. 30 Meters, equal to 9.9 megacycles (locate just below number 10 on your dial).
3. 19 Meters, equal to 15.1 megacycles (locate near 15 on your dial).
4. 48 Meters, equal to 6.2 megacycles (locate near number 6 on your dial).

TUNE SLOWLY — at the RIGHT TIME — at the RIGHT SPOT on your SHORTWAVE dial.
