By the grace and
mercy of our Lord,

benefits and turmoils of the ensuing
peace so dearly bought. It is a

This is the message broadcast over 600 times monthly in 14 languages from HCJB. 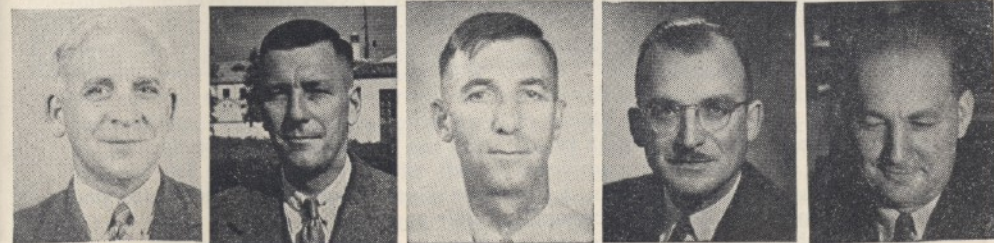

Down through the years God has graciously and magnificently enlarged our staff and co-labourers of Radio Station HCJB. Now once again, in the goodness of the Lord, we believe that He is leading us on to further conquests of the air for His glory in "Heralding Christ Jesus' Blessings." With our present installations, however, it is impossible to go forward with the proposed program. We must have larger grounds, increased power and transmitters together with adequate space for improved and better antennas.

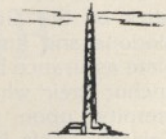
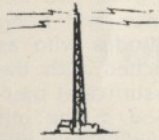
In addition, such a program calls for the construction of a new 10,000 watt transmitter for use on the 31 meter band to add to our present 10,000 watt transmitter on 24 meters. We estimate that the completion of the above mentioned projects will cost about \$62,000.00. The accomplishment of this advance program of expansion for Station HCJB, we believe, is in the will of God, in view of the

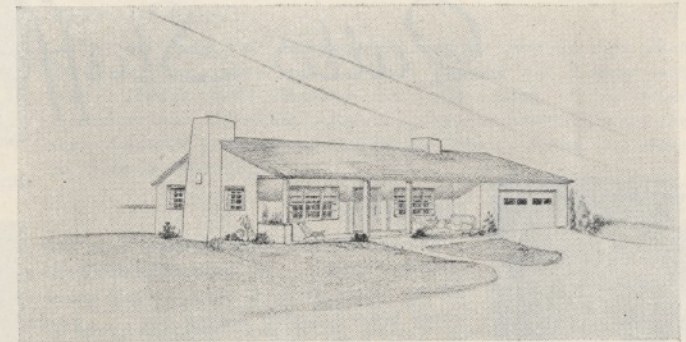
unprecedented spiritual need of the world today, and will in His providence, be of countless benediction and salvation to multitudes.

friends of HCJB for prayerful consideration and help.

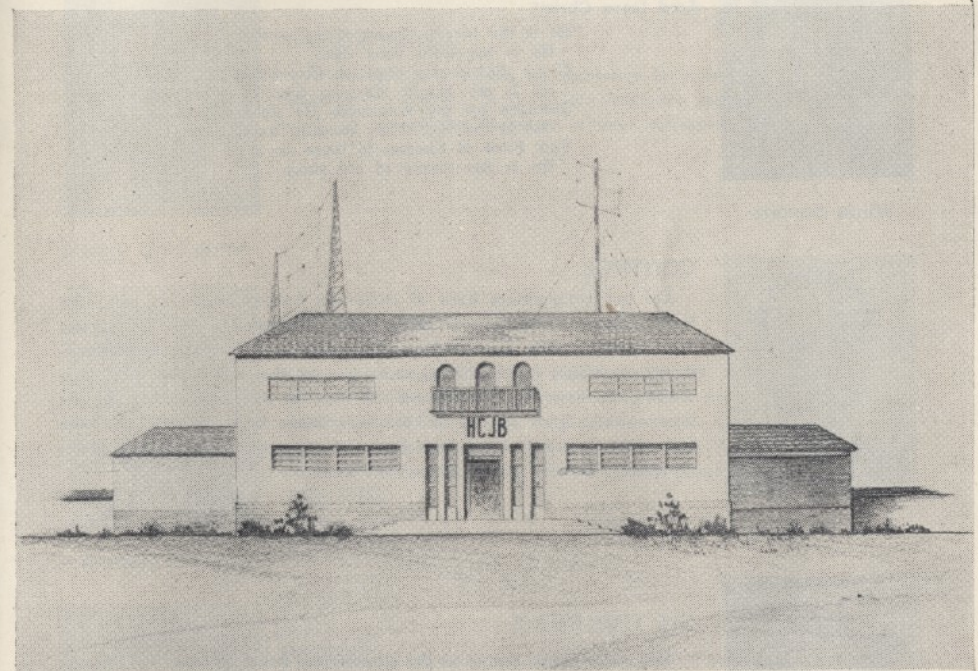

RECEIVERS

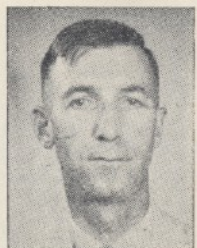

THE GOSPEL ON THE AIR IN LATIN AMERICA

The missionary sat down in her favorite chair as the Indian bearer brought in breakfast consisting of tea and toast. It was too early for the usual news reports from London, Berlin, or Moscow, so she twiddled the dial to find what there might be of interest. There came over the air the familiar strains of "Rock of Ages." For a moment she wondered if she were dead and in heaven, but no, the toast tasted like the usual scraped toast of India. Her heart was stirred. The program could not be from the United States because, she said later, usually it was "either beer or boogie woogie" that came from there. But the voice was American and the language English. At the end of the Gospel message the voice came in loud, clear tones, "You have been listening to the Voice of the Andes. This is Quito, Ecuador." Across the world in Jubbulpore, India, the Voice of the Andes was heard.

Since 1931 Station HCJB has been broadcasting cultural, educational and evangelical programs from Quito, the capital of Ecuador, in accordance with a twenty-five year contract with the government of that country. It now transmits 600 Gospel messages a month in fourteen different languages. These are heard not only throughout Latin America but also in many other parts of the world, from Iceland to Sumatra.

Throughout Latin America missionaries and national leaders, particularly the latter, are also broadcasting short weekly religious programs on bought time on local stations.

Radio is a most potent instrument for the spread of the Gospel. It enables the preacher to reach many thousands with his voice, at one time. The Gospel message can be heard in remote regions where no church services are held. In some such place people gather together to listen to a religious service. In Latin America evangelical broadcasting is a particularly effective instrument because of the prejudice many nominal Catholics have against entering a Protestant place of worship. Such people generally have no spiritual home because the Roman Catholic Church lacks spiritual vitality. Listening to Gospel messages over the air they become accustomed to the Protestant interpretation of Christianity. Through the proclamation of a positive message many are brought to a knowledge of Jesus Christ. A priest in Venezuela was converted to evangelical Christianity by listening to the weekly services broadcast from Ciudad Trujillo, in the Dominican Republic. He is now an evangelical pastor in that country.

Let it be made clear that the object of the evangelical broadcasting is not to attack the Roman Catholic Church. The Voice of the Andes station, which has a continuous program, carefully

avoids attack on the Catholic Church and anything that could be construed as mixing in politics. Other programs follow the same principles.

In the post-war period there will be a great development in radio work. There are probably about five million receiving sets in all Latin America today. In some countries the majority of the people are too poor to purchase them. There is every likelihood that in the post-war period manufacturers in the United States and perhaps in Latin America will produce cheap sets priced at a few dollars. In this case the number of radio listeners in Latin America will increase considerably.

Clarence W. Jones, Co-Director of the Voice of the Andes station, in 1945 made a visit to all the Latin American countries, sponsored jointly by the World Radio Missionary Fellowship and the Committee on Cooperation in Latin America. Besides being a Gospel musician of outstanding ability, Mr. Jones is well versed in the technical aspects of radio. On this trip Mr. Jones' counsel and experience was made available to hundreds of missionaries and national leaders. He has been able to make many leaders radio-conscious. In some countries the doors are at present closed to evangelical broadcasting owing to reactionary clericalism. In other countries, however, new programs have already gone on the air as a result of Mr. Jones' visit.

Mr. Jones has also made friendly contacts with many government radio technicians and directors. In Chile he

visited the factory of the Chilean Radio Corporation (a subsidiary of the Radio Corporation in America). This factory with its new building costing \$300,000 (U. S. currency) employs five hundred people and produces records, receivers and transmitters. RCA also has up-to-date recording studios with fine electrical and studio equipment capable of handling the best in commercial recording. Chile has sixty-four transmitters at the present time. There is a favorable attitude towards evangelical radio programs. For several years Dr. J. H. McLean has been broadcasting religious messages to a wide and responsive audience. Many of these have subsequently been published. The preparation of these messages sometimes requires from twenty to thirty hours of work. Evangelical radio programs have often suffered not only in Latin America but in the United States from lack of adequate preparation on the part of speakers. Dr. McLean advocates radio Gospel training courses in the seminaries and Christian colleges in the United States so that both pastors and missionaries will be prepared for this new age.

Mission boards need to set aside funds and personnel for radio work. They cannot do this, however, until the church constituencies become aware of the power of radio for the preaching of the Gospel in this day and generation and give them the means for a great advance. "And His dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the river to the ends of the earth."

THIS PAST YEAR

This past year has seen victory in Europe, in the Pacific, and at Radio Station HCJB.

Our five transmitters have consistently sounded out the message of assurance and salvation, strength and comfort in daily living, victory over our inhuman enemies and countless spiritual foes. The program of rebuilding three of our transmitters was completed and an additional transmitter



built with band-switching, to operate on 19 meters in the day time and on 48 meters at night. Two new antennas were erected, one directional and the other, rotary beam. A long-wave job is being installed in Guayaquil, the port city of Ecuador, and will be repeating our Spanish programs from Quito by the time this is read, D.V.

Our Studio "B" has been enlarged and is also used for Bible study classes. The first of a series of short-term Bible courses started in November, National Staff workers and outsiders have enrolled.

The Pioneer Missionary Radio compound is located to the north of Quito, in a new sector. Staff members, with pleasure and profit in spiritual exercise, conduct a growing Sunday School near the Station.

One of the special efforts during the past year was an 8-day radio

evangelistic campaign, in which young people's groups throughout Central and South America participated.

A member of our Staff received a 7,000-volt shock while working in the transmitter building. No apparent ill effects. But then, that is less than one volt for each Gospel program which went out over the Pioneer Missionary Radio Station last year. If only one per cent of the radio receivers in Latin America had one listener a day (there are more than 20 Gospel programs daily) that would give a daily congregation of 40,000 souls, and this does not allow for listeners to many of our 14-language programs heard at sea, in the air, the extreme north and south, and around the world.

It is impossible to know just how many listen; even the most conservative figures are very satisfying. One of our programs was retransmitted in Sweden. A DX Club in Stockholm received 300 reports on that one program and in Quito, we have received more than 300 airmail letters from Sweden during the first nine months of 1945. Our mail from everywhere is constantly increasing. Were it not for the war, with its restrictions on listening to shortwave, we, no doubt, would have had a great many more letters from Europe and elsewhere. What we have received is most gratifying. Sinners have confessed Christ; believers have been built up and encouraged; many groups throughout the continent listen regularly, forming part of the great congregation of HCJB.

We thrill at the thought of the many new listeners daily. One hundred new listeners to each program would mean 2,000 new listeners daily, or 730,000 new listeners in a year; and this, beyond all doubt, is a very small fraction of what is actually taking place. If only one in a thousand in Latin America would listen 14 times

**ORGANIZATION AND OPERATION OF THE WORLD RADIO
MISSIONARY FELLOWSHIP, INC.**

Radio station HCJB is owned and operated by The World Radio Missionary Fellowship, Inc., an Ohio non-profit corporation formed for the purpose of erecting and operating missionary radio stations. In addition to five transmitters at Quito and a small repeater station in Guayaquil, Ecuador, home activities are centered in an office at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

The by-laws of the organization provide for annual meetings for the election of officers. The administrative work is carried on by two co-directors, one resident on the field, the other in New York, alternating every three years. At present the Board of Trustees consists of: Clarence W. Jones (president and asst. treasurer), Reuben E. Larson (vice-president and treasurer), Manuel Garrido Aldama; D. Stuart Clark and John D. Clark.

a year, we would have a two-week evangelistic campaign with a daily attendance of 90,000 souls. Whether the number be greater or smaller could depend on the faithfulness of His children in prayer and partnership. "The Voice of the Andes" personnel have been kept in excellent health during the year, with minor exceptions. Each worker has given faithful, devoted, efficient service—overtime, as well, if that is possible in serving the Lord.

Six of our young people are in college, being trained for service, we hope with the World Radio Missionary Fellowship. One is in the United States Army service. Several workers who came to HCJB for a limited time have returned to their regular duties. New laborers have come to fill their places. A number of God's choice servants, ministering in various languages, have spent longer or shorter periods before our microphones during the year. The need for more reapers is great!

Our transmitting equipment has

name of the corporation. Consecutively numbered receipts are issued for all gifts and other income. Quarterly financial reports are issued. The accounting books in Quito and New York are audited regularly by recognized accounting firms.

District secretaries and representatives are available in several parts of the country to present the work to churches and conferences. Staff members home on furlough also spend a considerable portion of their time doing deputational work. For reference and as a source of information, there is a Home Advisory Council consisting of 28 well known Christian leaders in the United States, Canada and Great Britain.

stood up wonderfully well during the years of strain, when replacements were difficult. We must have new equipment soon, also more power for some of our wavelengths to more effectively "serve our generation by the will of God."

The message of His Excellency, the President of Ecuador, on "V" Day in Europe was given over HCJB, later retransmitted over the NBC Latin American network. Regularly, high government officials from within the country, as well as visiting dignitaries, make use of the microphones of HCJB. The liberty we enjoy and the evident high esteem in which this Station is held in Ecuador and beyond is a cause for humble gratitude to our God Who has been pleased to give us favor with Himself and with men.

From the recent survey made of Gospel radio work carried on in Latin America it is evident that more is being done than had been realized. Many new efforts are being initiated. Some have encouraged our hearts in saying that HCJB was used of God to stir up their pure hearts for Gospel radio ministry.

2. HOW TO TUNE HCJB

- A. Be sure your radio has a short wave band.
- B. Switch to short wave and tune to 12.5. As indicated above, you may also tune in at 15.1, 9.9, or 6.2 with better reception at certain times.
- C. Tune back and forth SLOWLY and with high volume.
- D. Be sure you tune at the right hour. Program listings are given in Eastern Standard Time, which is the same as Quito time.

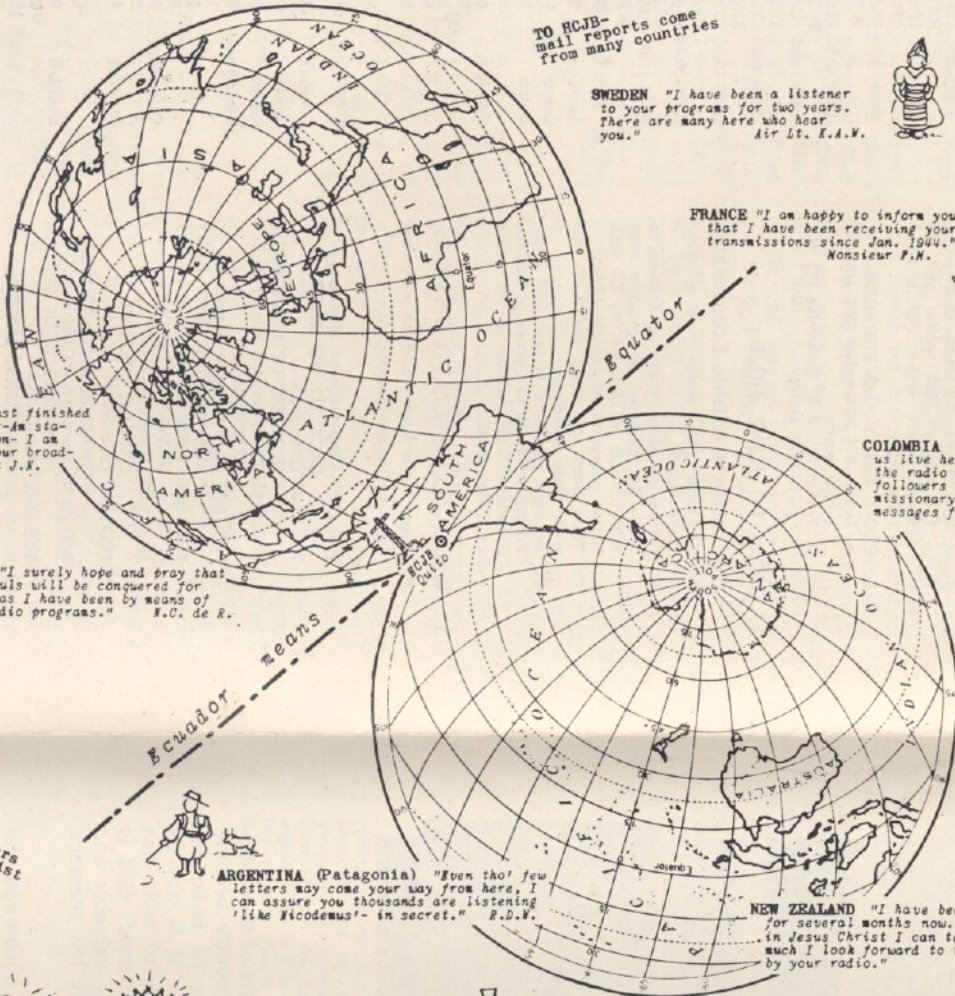

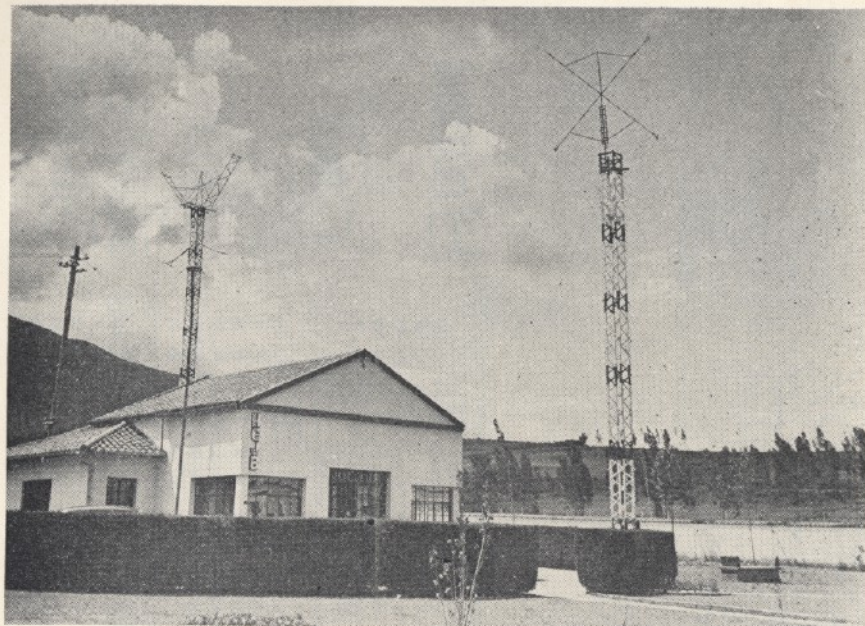

Through the summer night came strains of lovely music and a mellow voice speaking of inward peace and abounding joy. From the short wave radio that night came a vibrant testimony of one who had been filled to overflowing by the Giver of every good and perfect gift. "Odd, but beautiful," I said as I listened.

The terminology was a little unfamiliar, but the music spoke in no uncertain terms of something real. I passed it up that night as just another good "find" for my shortwave schedule, but the music lingered. There was something different about this and I listened again and again.

Listening to the Word faithfully and attractively presented by the HCJB staff, I was vitally interested; yet when the verse, "All of our righteousnesses are as filthy rags," was quoted, I tuned in elsewhere, for that hit home!

A Day with the Stationwagon

From five o'clock in the morning until eleven at night the HCJB stationwagon (or "camioneta," as we call it) faithfully and continually carries out a schedule of trips that scarcely permits it to catch its "mechanical breath." No piece of HCJB equipment is used so unceasingly; and right here we take our "hats off" to the conscientious, devoted chauffeur—Tobias, without whose services everyone's schedule would be thrown into utter confusion.

Remember that the studios and transmitters of HCJB are on the edge of the city of Quito—almost out in the country. To reach the studios a twenty-minute walk is necessary after coming to the end of the bus line, and at night even this bus service cannot be depended upon. Radio people must be on time—you cannot rush into the studio ten minutes late and offer your apologies. Thus the stationwagon must bear the responsibility of getting the dozens of program participants at the studios on time—a terrific job.

Imagine, for example, what would be the result if at least fifty people in the U. S., living in scattered sections of a city, were daily dependent on just ONE car to transport them to and from work; and add to it a situation in which about twenty of those same folk wanted that same car to do their shopping, bring the milk each day, run all kinds of errands, meet trains and airplanes, go after the mail, and so on. That is the job of our "camioneta." Also remember that a trip from HCJB to the center of Quito and back takes about forty-five minutes, dodging herds of cattle and sheep being driven to market along the highway, and encountering many "road hogs" in the form of stubborn burros that don't feel in the mood of moving out of the way. Well, perhaps you can begin to picture the job that the chauffeur, Tobias, and the

much-used station wagon have.

Here is a typical day:

- 5:00 a.m.—Time to pick up some Staff member or friend of the Station who wants to catch a six o'clock train.
- 6:00 a.m.—The early morning shift (an announcer, a couple of technicians and a Portuguese-speaking young lady for the early morning program in that language) are waiting at a downtown location.
- 7:30 a.m.—Time to go for the soloist and preacher who will be conducting the Spanish Gospel broadcast at eight o'clock.
- 8:10 a.m.—By now some of the early shift are ready to leave and Peggy Jo Larson must be on her way to her work at the U. S. Embassy and Steve Savage is taken to school. But hurry back for several others will soon be ready and anxious to be on their way.
- 8:35 a.m.—Take some to the bus line, bring others back.
- 9:00 a.m.—Go to a milk depot to bring milk for about twenty people connected with the HCJB Staff. At the same time perform various errands for different individuals. For example: "Oh, Tobias, I'm just out of sugar and bread. It will only take a minute for you to stop and get some for me. Thanks a lot." Another housewife: "Tobias, I know you wouldn't mind stopping around at the Bostrom's house and giving this note to Marjorie. Wait a minute for her reply." Then just as the car is pulling out the gate, a fellow whistles and runs up with a pair of shoes. "Say, Tobias, would you leave this pair of shoes at the little shop down the line? But tell them I've got to have them day after tomorrow, and ask them for a reasonable price."

Once again the chauffeur shifts gears and expectantly steps on the gas, only to hear another shrill voice calling, "Oh, Tobias, I'm going to have company this afternoon and I've just got to

The Gospel broadcasting is still in its initial phase. The evangelistic efforts made so far from the microphones of HCJB, the Pioneer Missionary Broadcaster, are only the beginning and have given us just a glimpse of the possibilities and range of the Gospel missionary agency.

There is no other kind of work either in the missionary field or at home that stands in such a great need of intercessory prayer as the broadcasting of the Gospel, for no other spiritual work can become so exhausting and discouraging as preaching over the microphone twice daily to an invisible audience. This certainly is a subject everyone should feel compelled to pray for daily, so that the messenger may restore continually his spiritual strength and resources from the in-

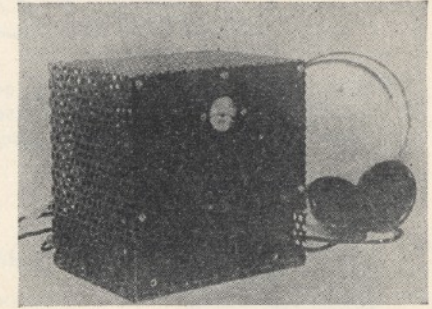
exhaustible riches of the grace and wisdom of Christ. Only then will he be able to present the Gospel daily, not in a monotonous and unattractive way, but in a fresh, vital and dynamic way, such as the greatness of the Gospel of Christ deserves.

Such are some of the questions which have been asked on more than one occasion by people that could not understand the existence of such an institution with its tremendous running expenses without the backing of some rich financial concern. ON THIS RADIO RECEIVER HCJB WAS HEARD DURING NAZI OCCUPATION OF NORWAY



This is the letter that came to HCJB, Quito, Ecuador, recently with the accompanying picture:

OSLO, NORWAY, den 26, September, 1945.

I listened to the Voice of the Andes on Sunday, Sept. 23rd, 1945, at 21:30 Greenwich m.t., on 24 meter wave . . . Heard Swedish sermons, etc. . . . On behalf of my countrymen would like to express my thanks for the good wishes you sent on the liberation of Norway and Denmark.

The reason why you have not heard from Norwegian listeners during the war is that our wireless sets were seized by the Germans in 1941, and listening-in was forbidden on pain of death. I received, however, a small three-valve receiving set from England by parachute, and I have been able to listen to your station with it . . . I would greatly appreciate it if you would send me pamphlets about the station so that I can write about it in the publication CHRISTIAN YOUTH (Norwegian). Yours truly,

And thus it goes from five in the morning until eleven at night, and unfortunately, the camioneta is frequently subject to flat tires, engine trouble and the like—more trouble for Tobias. And terrible woe and chaos it is for all of us when the automobile doctor declares that the car must go to the garage for a couple days. Such an event almost paralyzes everything.

As a sidelight, consider the linguistic "stew" that is regularly heard during these trips. By broadcasting in fourteen different languages, that means people are coming and going who speak a great conglomeration of dialects. A fitting slogan could well be, "Ride in the HCJB station wagon and you will hear all of the world's important languages."

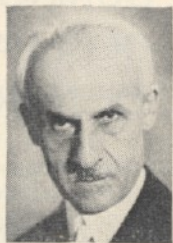

"EVERY MAN HEARD IN HIS OWN LANGUAGE"

HCJB's language department reports that during the Nazi occupation of Norway, it was hardly imagined that HCJB's programs would be received by any of the Norwegian people in their homeland because listening in to outside broadcasts was forbidden on pain of death. To make certain the decree was obeyed, all receiving sets were seized by the invaders.

An intensely interesting happenstance occurred. A Christian young man, Kjell Gaarder, had a small three tube receiving set dropped to him by parachute from English flyers, and in the secrecy necessary to hide the fact from the Nazis, he regularly tuned in to the Swedish broadcasts from HCJB. Thus, during the arduous tests and exigencies of the Norwegian occupation, he derived spiritual food and courage radiating from a point in the Republic of Ecuador, thousands of miles away. No one will be able to compute how much blessing and inspiration has gone forth from HCJB's spot high up in the Andes during the war years to many in like circumstances as Kjell Gaarder.

GI Benjamin J. King, whose home is in California, was stationed last August in the town of Attersee in Austria. His company had captured a German Army communications-type receiving set. Using this captured equipment on the night of August 1st, he tuned around the dial and came

upon HCJB's signal. Even though his only antenna was a piece of wire attached to the bedsprings, the station "came in strongly—the volume was equivalent to local European shortwave stations." He listened from 12:30-1:00 o'clock in the morning (his time) to the Gospel program, "Radio Chapel," that was sent out from Quito at 5:30 in the late afternoon.

By the way, do you know what the ten principal languages are in the world? Chinese heads the list with 475,000,000 people speaking that language. Following in order are: English, Hindustani (and other Indian dialects), Russian, Spanish, German, Japanese, French, Bengali and Portuguese.

What a challenge exists at the present time to give the German-speaking people the true Gospel message, following the many years of their subjection to the devilish doctrines of the Nazis, such as "might is right," "the superiority of the German race," etc. HCJB has carefully studied this opportunity and need and has added to its schedule a Sunday program in this language. Mr. Seidnitz, a devoted Christian man residing in Quito, is conducting this broadcast.

Thus the Pioneer Missionary Broadcaster continues to minister to peoples in every section of the globe, enabling "every man to hear in his own language," whether it be Spanish, Portuguese, English, Swedish, French, Russian, Dutch, Italian, Quechua, Yiddish, Czechoslovakian, Greek, Arabic, or German. Passage to field—\$300.00 per adult ($\frac{1}{2}$ for child)

Equipment—\$300.00 per adult ($\frac{1}{2}$ for child)

Each child receives a proportionate adult allowance as follows:

Pre-school 30%; grade school 40%; High School 50%.
